Directions to Sauk Rapids Rice High School 1835 Osauka Rd NE, Sauk Rapids MN 56379:

Coming over Sauk Rapids Bridge – Cross over bridge onto 2nd St. N, follow 2nd St. N up the hill and over Hwy 10, drive 1.5 miles, turn left onto Osauka Rd. NE.

Coming North on Hwy 15 – Take Hwy 15 thru St. Cloud, cross the Mississippi River; take the first exit, Benton Dr. At the first stoplight take a left onto 2nd St. N –stay on 2nd St. N. Cross over Hwy 10, go 1.5 miles, turn left onto Osauka Rd. NE.

Coming from the East on Hwy 23 – Turn west onto Hwy 10, travel 2 miles, take a right onto Golden Spike Road/Co. Rd. 3 – go 1.3 mile turn left onto Osauka Rd. NE.

Jan Turner – In 1989, Jan was stricken with pneumococcal pneumonia, the same disease that killed Jim Henson, the creator of The Muppets, in 1990. She first started experiencing flu-like symptoms but knew it was more serious when her fingers began to

ache and the pain began to move through her body. She was taken via helicopter to Abbott Northwestern Hospital in Minneapolis where she was put on full life support. Her family was told she would not survive. Due to a lack of blood circulation, her limbs developed gangrene and had to be amputated. Throughout the ordeal Jan never considered giving up. Jan spent the first eight months of 1900 at Sister Kenny Institute, where she learned how to use her prosthetic arms and legs. She continued teaching music for two years but unable to play the piano, trumpet and guitar with prosthetics, she decided to return to college and earn a degree in speech communication. Jan will share her inspirational story.

After a pediatrician diagnosed Alex with inattentive attention deficit disorder (ADD), Laura learned about fetal alcohol syndrome through an acquaintance and did research. Alex was diagnosed with FASD in 2005. While her initial goal in researching FASDs was to help her son, she and Alex now passionately share their knowledge with others.

A-2 Walk In My Shoes – Ryan is a 21 year student at the Community Options 2 program in the St. Cloud Area School District. A-3 Impact of Early Care Settings on Attachment Formation — An amazing opportunity for Support Development Professionals who work in early childhood to support the development of attachment with children in their care. This training will define attachment and explain factors that impact attachment. Attendees will learn how to identify attachment seeking behaviors and supportive responses. A-4 Dyslexia – **Signs and Solutions** – Although dyslexia is the most common reading disability, it is also the most misunderstood. These are often the children who have great gifts in other areas – an aspect that complicates the puzzle. A-5 Basics of Brain injury – Learn about the effects of brain injury on families, the grief family members experience, and cognitive, physical and emotional consequences of brain injury. Learn strategies, tips, current information about the brain, brain injury prevention, research, resources, and statistics. Brain Injury Alliance - Minnesota (All)

A-6 Modifying Approaches: Effective Interventions when working with Individuals with a Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder – In Minnesota, more than 8,500 babies are born each year with prenatal alcohol exposure. We will discuss daily living skills: money management, behavior management, self-care, and more. Heather Zoeller – MOFAS (E, T)

B-1 Collaborating with Culturally Diverse Families with Children with Special Needs – A panel of local service providers who also have a family member with a disability will share their perspectives about being a service provider for families from a variety of cultures and being a family member navigating the special education system. Experience cross-cultural interactions, and learn new strategies to guide you in your work with your diverse students and their families. Panel led by Teri Estrem, PhD, CCC SLP – SCSU (All)

B-2 I Wonder: Using Curiosity to Understand and Address Children's Behavior – What if caregivers used their curiosity to resolve challenging behaviors? Learn how to use reflective thinking to understand how development, trauma, and attachment influence behaviors. Behavior is a form of communication that caregivers can learn to interpret when time is taken to process the meaning. Explore a toolbox of strategies for preventing and addressing behavior in infants, toddlers and preschoolers. Tracy Schreifels, MS, LMFT (P)

B-3 Self-Regulation – Tools to help individuals become effective problem solvers and develop social and emotional regulation. Learn about self-regulation strategies for individuals in early childhood and elementary school. Tara Prom, MSW, LGSW (P, E)

B-4 Understanding Autism Spectrum Disorders – Understanding the thinking processes of individuals on the autism spectrum is not just for researchers! This presentation will focus on ways in which understanding cognitive differences in ASD can guide the development of effective intervention strategies. Examples of interventions used with individuals with ASD of varying ages and ability levels will be provided. Rebecca Schroeder, PhD, LP, Staff Psychologist – St. Cloud Hospital (All)

B-5 Reactive Attachment – Is a disorder characterized by children that have been neglected and or abused. These disturbances have occurred by the age of 5. These children can display behaviors of being excessively friendly to strangers or having difficulty trusting others. This can come along with oppositional behaviors and difficulty attaching to others. The presentation will consist of common characteristics in children with RAD, as well as basic interventions for caretakers and teachers who interact with children of this diagnosis. B-6 Morals, Manners and Risky Behavior – For sensory-driven kids with poor impulse control and obsessive behaviors, the discovery of sexuality can be perplexing. Availability of access to the internet, and the inability for parents and caregivers to supervise every situation can create daily frustrations.
